# **Skinny Jump**



#### Affordable Broadband for your Home.

Skinny Jump brings affordable, flexible broadband to thousands of Kiwi homes. If you don't have an existing internet connection, or your current one is too expensive, Skinny Jump might be right for you. If you or someone you know is interested in signing up for this service, give us a ring on (03) 546 8100, and we'll book a time for you to sign up in the library.

Skinny Jump is subsidised by the Spark Foundation and offered through a partnership between the Digital Inclusion Alliance Aotearoa and Nelson Public Libraries.

When you sign up, you will receive a free modem, pre-loaded with 35GB of data. Additional data can be purchased for \$5 per 35GB, and you can top up six times a month. There is no fixed contract and no credit check.

# Updates on Elma Turner Library



Nelson's central library is temporarily closed after an inspection found the ceiling tiles could pose an earthquake-related hazard.

Strengthening work will be undertaken in stages to add bracing to the ceiling grids to improve the safety of the building. We will also be installing hold-down clips to restrain all tiles.

Strengthening work was completed on the children's and activity room on 20 July. The next stage will cover the remainder of the building.

Why did Nelson City Council request a Detailed Seismic Assessment (DSA) Report for Elma Turner Library?

Council reviewed its buildings after receiving an Earthquake Prone Building notice for ceiling tiles in its main staff building on Trafalgar Street. The initial review of Elma Turner Library found ceiling tiles were heavier than expected (weighing between 8kg and 11kg) and pose an earthquake hazard.

Why did Council close the Elma Turner Library?

The closure was a precaution due to the heavy weight of the ceiling tiles while we learnt more about the risk and how it could be mitigated. Council could not accept the level of risk present in a high-traffic public facility with a number of vulnerable users.

The cost of the completed work was within the existing budget of \$200,000 for strengthening work included in the 2021/2031 Long Term Plan.

We don't yet know the timeframes or the costs of the remainder of the work which encompasses the majority of the Elma Turner Library.



We love these titles which are available on our shelves or as eBooks through the BorrowBox app.








We will also be offering two free Introduction to te reo Māori classes.

ComicsPlus is great way to access thousands of comics, graphic novels and manga. It's super easy to download, and searching for books is a breeze!


It has the option to stream books or download them to read later which is great if you are travelling.


It also has all our favourites, so if you can't wait for your hold to come in chances are it'll be on ComicsPlus!
