

We were busy helping hundreds of people set up My Health accounts to download and print their vaccination passes. So busy that we visited the Victory and Pūtangitangi Greenmeadows Community Centres to run three drop-in vaccine pass help sessions.

The Friends of the Library Inc have made the decision to amalgamate with the Nelson Institute and held their final meeting in December. We are so thankful for the support the Friends have provided over the years as they volunteered their time to run book sales and funded events such as the music in the library, various author talks, and our summer reading programmes.

The Nelson Institute established the first Nelson Public Library. It was set up in 1841 on the Whitby ship as it made its way to Aotearoa. Soon after arriving, a collection of 700 books was gathered, which was to become one of New Zealand's first public libraries. Although Nelson City Council took over control of the library during the 1960s, the Institute have always provided support and will continue to do so as they take over many of the activities funded by the Friends.

Sit back and relax while we read you a story



We all know nothing brings people together like reading and the library is excited to run two groups which are all about building connections between words and people. Known as Shared Reading, these sessions are run by our trained librarian, Jodie, who will read aloud a short story or poem before inviting others to talk about what we have read. There is no need for group members to read aloud or speak – it's fine to just listen and enjoy a cup of tea.

We are also pleased to work with Alzheimer's Nelson to bring back Tea & Tales, a Dementia Friendly group. This uses shorter texts and poems which have been shown to improve wellbeing and have a significant effect on the preservation and promotion of language skills.

Did you or someone in your whānau receive a new device for Christmas? Stay savvy online.

School's out, homework is in

Do some reading and get ahead of the curve. Listen to a podcast such as Vergecast, read some Netsafe articles, or browse our books on a range of technologies and related topics.

Show and tell

Get out from behind your device and show someone how to do something new on their phone. Ask for a demo in return. It's a great way to learn and a good conversation starter for whānau.

Look for flags to stay safe Doday emails and txts have easy

Dodgy emails and txts have easy-tospot red flags. Answering yes to more than one of these questions suggests that it is malicious. Mark emails as 'phishing' and don't open any links.

- Is the message unexpected?
- Does it have spelling or grammatical errors or an unusual tone?

- Is it void of any specific details? (e.g., an email about your car rego that does not contain your rego number, car make, or rego expiry date)
- Is it urging you to take action or do something quickly?


